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

fter John completed 5 years at Canberra Grammar School as boarder, he went home to Gundagai to join his parents in their Central

Service Station and Car Dealership business. He worked as a Car Salesman, Book keeper, Bowser operator and sometimes Mechanic.

We married in 1959 and went on our honeymoon in a Caravan pulled by a Morris Minor.

We spent the first night at Romano's Hotel in Wagga and pulled up in front of the Police Station nearby with a loud racket. Some of our friends had filled the hub caps with stones! We travelled to Melbourne and right around the coast to Wollongong, then home to our first home we built in Gundagai.


We did a lot of surfing at Lakes Entrance and became so sunburnt, we could not touch each other! Just out of Goulburn we were pulled up by the Police for not having mirrors that could see past the caravan, we went back to Goulburn and bought some but we never put them on.

After our first daughter was born in 1960, John bought me my first car. A 1936 Morris

It had belonged to my Uncle who had bought it new but had it up on blocks during the war because of petrol shortages. It had a crank handle which I had to use sometimes if I wasn't on a hill. We sold it to someone in Tasmania for 40 pounds. John then bought me a black 54 Morris Minor which I drove until 1976.

John left the family business in 1960 and joined Tutt Bryant, selling Earth Moving Machinery for a couple of years before joining Queensland Insurance (the forerunner of QBE). John's first venture into car restoration occurred in our Wagga years when he purchased an old car in a paddock. Fortunately, he didn't bring it home and, subsequently, sold it on when we moved to Griffith in 1972.

He always had a Company car supplied but over the years he owned a Triumph, Peugeot and a Saab as he loved British and European cars.

aka Bayerische Motoren Werke

AG, was founded in 1916 and has its HO in Munich, Bavaria (built to resemble air cooled cylinders, above), where it also has a BMW museum, not far from the Munich Olympics swimming pool, and the football field where Fußball-Club Bayern München eV used to play their home games.

So it was from here that the previous owner bought the car new and

kept it in Europe for two years and then had it shipped to Sydney. The 323i was kept for special driving occasions and kept in pride of place in the garage, regularly polished, maintained serviced.

I saw the 323i advertised for sale in the internet, 1984 and in mint condition and only 100,000 kms? Sounded unusual! It was located on Sydney's North Shore. After a journey to Sydney I was met at the suburban train station by the then owner in the 323i. It looked great and I decided on one first sight that I would buy it.

BUT NOT SO FAST! Steady on. First I had to survive a rigorous interview and a social etiquette challenge.

I was driven to the owner's home for morning tea and a long discussion about the car and what I intended to do with it. Later, I inspected the vehicle, confirming manufactured to Australian standards. He it's near mint condition. Lunch with the





owner and his wife followed together with further discussion about the car.

Would I garage it? What were our club runs?

Finally the deal was agreed and in the mid-afternoon, I set off home with the car and a large bag of sweet smelling lemons from the sellers' garden. The much loved 323i was farewelled as I drove out on to the road home. Our 323i is just 30 years old so is now eligible for historic registration. The 323i is an example of the new generation of historic cars. It has most of the mod cons found on a new car: air con, power steering, power windows, central locking and even a primitive computer that shows average fuel consumption, average speed and even the outside temperature.

It also still has its complete tool kit.

It does not have fancy air bags and safety features of a modern car. Unfortunately, it runs on leaded fuel.

Benita and I hope to get as much joy from the car as the previous owners.

I am sure we will.


Open shearing winner was the "Old Fella" Mick Brownlie (41) with runner up Grant Lundie (early 20s). Onya Mick.
