## Roots Run Deep at Windellema

John and I had an enjoyable excursion with the Club to Windellema on Sunday 16 May. We wish to thank Warren & Jodie for their hospitality and we wish them well in their endeavours to renovate their home.

I was aware that my some of my ancestors came from the Windellema district and many are in the private Roberts cemetery at 'Bronti' not far from where we were on Sunday but I did not realise until we arrived home what connections they had to 'Buburba'. After a little research in a book titled 'The Roberts Family, 1835-1978' I discovered the following.

My Great Grandfather, Robert Roberts and his brother John Roberts arrived in Sydney from London in 1835 after a six month sea journey. They then applied for Government grants of land in the Windellema district. Robert was accompanied by his new wife, Mary and John had a wife and nine children. Robert & Mary travelled from Sydney to Goulburn with all their goods on a bullock dray, a journey that took three weeks. They eventually settled at 'Bronti' and had twelve children.

The following is a quotation from the book written in 1978.



"John's Granddaughter Sadie married Alex Henderson the owner of "Buburba" land and in the 1880's the homestead itself was built. Skilled tradesmen were employed for a wage of thirty six shillings a week. Before construction began, a

kiln was built on the site for the baking the home made bricks. The sandstone slabs for the deep solid foundations were quarried from a nearby hill. The brick walls are 11 feet high and the woodwork Page 18 The Wheel

gives evidence of the skill of the carpenters employed;. the house is still as solid as when it was built almost 100 years ago. The house is designed with a large arched hallway which opens onto two wide verandahs, giving magnificent views of the property and all the rooms but one, have open fireplaces."


The Henderson Family lived at **'Buburba'** until 1924 when it was sold. In 1950 the property was acquired by Sidney and Bessie Williams" [nee Elizabeth Mary Roberts, Great Granddaughter of Robert Roberts, my Great Grandfather]

Between 1924 and 1950 the property changed hands twice and we learnt on Sunday that our club member Maree Burke's grandparents, Radford and Eileen Hockey owned the property from 1939 to 1950. Her Mum was with us and able to reminisce back 50 years.

In the book there is a picture of the house and one of cattle grazing down near the creek where we had our lunch. From letters I have in my possession I have learnt that my Mum, nee Ilma Roberts visited Bessie Williams at "**Buburba**" in 1995.

I thought I would like to share with STHARC members the amazing coincidence of our Sunday drive and I hope you may find it interesting.


