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THE 'WHOLE' SOUTHERN TABLELANDS

One of the problems of being "retired", and I put that in quotes very deliberately, is that I now seem to have less spare time than ever. I hear it's a common problem. And that's my excuse for not having written something before now for *The Wheel*.

I was inspired to write this article following the outcome of the August meeting of the Council of ACT Motor Clubs. But let me go back one chapter in the story, the issue of cross-border registrations. The issue of cross-border registration was raised at the July meeting, with the STHARC committee agreeing that it would be in our best interest to seek approval to operate "cross border", as ACT clubs are seeking historic registration rights in NSW.

Some years ago, when I was more involved with the ACT Council, the procedure for clubs wanting access to historic registration was to put their request in writing, then give a brief supporting presentation to the Council Meeting. The request was then forwarded with Council's recommendation to the ACT Motor Registry, where approval was automatic.

Equipped with this knowledge, John Corbett and I, as the STHARC delegates to the Council of ACT Motor Clubs went along to the August Council meeting primed-up to give a rousing speech about our Club. We also had a formal letter of request at the ready.

Before the meeting, it seemed useful to have a few words to Graham Gittins, the Council President. So we did. "No worries, just talk to the Registrar" said Graham. Then we went to the Registrar and told him what we wanted to do. "Well, your club is fully paid up as a member of the

Council, that's all that's needed" he said. "Uh, what about our letter of request and rousing speech in support?" we asked. "No, need, if your club is a financial member, that's it. The meeting's about to start, catch up with me at the half time break and I'll fix things up then" he replied.

And he did. During the break, as our Club Registrar, John was given all the necessary paperwork, authorisations, stamps and such. So, STHARC is now fully approved to arrange ACT Historic Registration for any ACT-based members, in the same way as it already does for members in NSW

This is a very significant development, because it means our Southern Tablelands club now is able to provide coverage of the entire region, without an artificial "hole" created by political borders. More specifically, it opens up a considerably greater potential membership base. I am sure that many of us have friends in Canberra who would be right at home in our club: now we can invite them to join us. And it was all so simple – after the meeting, John was still shaking his head in amazement (so was I, though I tried not to let on).



Outback Trip August 2003 -Part 2

This month we continue with Allan and Christine on their outback adventure.

Friday 8/8 Boulia to Winton, via Middleton Hotel



Winton is a tidy, well set out town that boasts the Waltzing Mathilda Centre, as our famous song originates from this town. We toured the centre that provides a peek into the area's past, the people and the environment. We also visited the local out air theatre (and roller skating rink), admired opals, more panoramas of the dinosaurs that used to live in the long ago inland sea, and admired an old department store (Corfields and Mauritz) that still has a partially intact "flying fox" (overhead cable cash system). We stayed behind the North Gregory Hotel where Waltzing Mathilda was first performed publicly – the Hotel also provided an internet centre, displayed art and craft (for sale), provided free camping and smorgasbord meals. It is a good example of how these outback enterprises diversify their interests to stay viable.

Saturday 9/8 Winton - Longreach - Barcaldine

Behind the Hotel is Arno's Wall – a huge cement wall infilled with just about anything you can imagine – motor bikes, stationery engines, letter boxes, statues, pots and pans, stoves, fridge doors, wheels ... absolutely amazing. Leaving Winton we drove

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on a good sealed road (Mathilda Highway) through good cattle and sheep country. The scenery was varied with hilly ranges, grassland, and stretches of gibber stone. It is a relatively short drive to Longreach.

At Longreach, we visited the QANTAS museum that provides an excellent history to this famous airline, and now has a 747 parked outside for tours. Opposite is the Stockman's Hall of Fame, our focus for visiting Longreach. It comprises 5 levels providing an excellent overview of life in the outback — the hardships faced and the good times: for lone farmers, the stockmen (both black and white), town life, women, and the coming of services to outback Queensland. It features stories about "everyday" Australians and brings the past into the present. There are interactive displays as well as enormous slide shows. The next museum was the Power House Museum that shows how power was provided to Longreach until a few years ago.

We decided to drive onto Barcaldine to stay, and after pulling into the first caravan park we saw, were delighted to be entertained by Graham Rodger, a country and western performer, and his daughter Julie. This town is neither thriving nor dying (yet), although many of the pubs are showing their age.

Sunday 10/8 Barcaldine – Blackall – Augathella – Charleville We did a quick lap of Barcaldine; stopped at the Tree of Knowledge (ghost gum) where the Australian Labour Party arose as a result of the Great Shearer's Strike of 1891, attended St Peter's Church (heritage listed for its beautiful stained glass windows), and headed for Blackall. Blackall boasts the only restored steam-powered woolscour factory in working order, and showed us an aspect of the shearing industry we had not experienced in our travels. Then it was back on the road, passing through Tambo (restored police station with outside lockup), Augathella with its wonderful murals on building walls and into Charleville.

Monday 11/8 Charleville – Cunnamulla – Bourke

Charleville is the largest town in South West Queensland, pop approx 3500 and is a rich pastoral area. Included in Charleville's claims to fame are that Cobb and Co had its largest and longest running coach making factory there and the abortive rainmaking experiment using the Vortex Gun was carried out. We visited the Historic House museum that boasted a railway ambulance and an enormous coolibah tree in its garden. On leaving Charleville, the land is dry and scrubby but alive with bird life.

Heading south we passed through Wyandra, pop 60, that is becoming typical of many small towns where free camping is advertised to entice the traveller and tourist to stop, in an attempt to stay "alive". Cunnamulla, the focus of a documentary on a small Queensland town "Cunnamulla", was our lunch stop. On one of his previous trips, Allan had met two of the town's colourful characters included in that movie, the local taxi driver and his wife, so we stopped by to catch up with them and the town's news (the drug dealer was still in business as well as the local junk dealer).

Leaving Cunnamulla, we were back in red dirt country. Before reaching the Qld/NSW border we had to pull off the road to let pass a semi carrying an enormous mine vehicle – it took up both lanes of the highway. Back into NSW (the Kidman Highway) and the countryside changed from pastoral to agricultural – citrus, wine, cotton – and we were at Bourke. We stayed at Kidman Camp on the Darling River, a camping resort north of Bourke that provided a safe haven for travellers. Although Bourke is changing its image, Allan noted that the local liquor outlet was completely fenced in and that the drive-through salesman was seated in a cage. The remainder of the town appeared normal, quiet and relatively tidy.

Tuesday 12/8 Bourke – Dubbo

It rained overnight, the first serious rain we experienced so far on our trip. We visited the Back O' Bourke Centre (Stage 1) that

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once finished will provide a facility to exhibit the unique features – cultural, historical, geographical and environmental - of Bourke and the surrounding countryside. We drove around the town admiring the old brick buildings, the replica wharf, and visited Fred Hollows grave (that also has a sandstone monument similar to the one outside of Broken Hill).

Villages are now closer together, some trying to attract tourists and travellers whereas others are obviously dying. We had our lunch

stop at Nyngan, the town put on the map some ten years ago by devastating floods, and continued through a number of small towns that appeared to be thriving, to Narromine and citrus fruits. Our destination, Dubbo is a thriving regional centre with



numerous tourist attractions (Western Plains Zoo, Old Dubbo Gaol, river cruises, wineries, museums) and all the facilities of a city. We planned to visit the Zoo the next day, but wonderful torrential rain put paid to that idea.

Wednesday 13/8 Dubbo - Wellington - Queanbeyan

We left in rain, stopping at Wellington for morning tea. Then trouble struck, the back window of the van shattered leaving us with a gaping hole and rain coming in. We cleaned up the glass, quickly decided that home as quickly as possible was the best plan, and headed off to Queanbeyan via Molong and Cowra (Peace Bell). Not until we reached the Hume Highway, just south of Yass, did we double up on roads already travelled on this particular trip. Not bad considering we drove just over 5300kms in the twelve days we were away.

We arrived back in town begrudging the traffic lights, lanes of cars and bitumen and dreamed of long stretches of gravel road without another car in sight.
