Margaret told us of her exhibition in New York and the Island of Terschelling in The Netherlands, the island of Terschelling being the former home of her mother. Terschelling is the third of the West Frisian Islands just above the Waddenzee and above Noord Holland and Friesland. Both her exhibitions were very successful, with some of her paintings now hanging in the Australian embassy.

Margaret mentioned that her painting skills improved quite dramatically at the time of the Olympics. She had a contract to paint Australian scenes on boomerangs and didgeridoos for sale at the Olympics. After painting a couple of hundred thousand boomerangs etc, her painting speed improved quite dramatically and she was now more than happy that the Olympics had finished.

Margaret then introduced us to the male artist working in the shed with her. His work was very different and not easy to describe. He doesn't normally sell his work. He also stretches the canvas onto frames for sale and also will stretch works which people buy overseas to frame when they return to Australia. He and Margaret also teach art classes as do other artists employed by them. It was a very interesting visit to the shed.

We returned to the Guide Hall in time for another cuppa and sat with the men to watch the end of the race. A good day was had by all.

Did you know ....

### The first car BMW produced was the Dixi

BMW looked to enter the small car market and in 1927 agreed a licence with the <u>Austin Motor Company</u> to build the <u>Austin 7</u>.

A production level of 2000 cars a year was agreed with Austin being paid a royalty on each one made.

The first 100 cars were supplied as kits but by December 1927 the first of the real Dixis, the DA-1 3/25PS were coming off the production line. DA stood for Deutsche Ausfuhrung meaning German Version and 3/15 indicated the taxation and actual horse power ratings.

Apart from being left-hand drive and using metric threaded fasteners, the car was nearly identical to the Austin. Body styles available were coupe, roadster, tourer and sedan with a few chassis going to external coachbuilders. Most cars left the factory as tourers.

Looking to move into automobile manufacturing, BMW bought the

Automobilwerk Eisenach in 1928 and, with it, the rights to build the Dixi car.

At first the cars were badged as BMW Dixi but the Dixi name was dropped in 1929 when the DA-1 was replaced by a slightly updated version, the BMW 3/15 DA-2.

#### **Another Historic Motoring Event**

Many club members of our club are also members of other car clubs. In our case Jane and I are members of specific marque clubs for Rolls Royce and Bentley.

The Henry Royce Foundation is the primary repository of historic Rolls Royce related memorabilia in Australia. One of the members of the Rolls Royce Owners Club of Australia recently purchased the historic and heritage listed Studley Park near Narellan. Arrangements have been made for the Henry Royce Foundation to have the use of the original nineteenth century mansion as a national headquarters for the next twenty years. The ACT owners club recently arranged for an outing to inspect the property. Three of the cars which participated are owned by members of STHARC so it was almost a club outing.

The principal building is a stately manor but unfortunately requires substantial renovation just to preserve it. Massive expenditure would be needed to fully restore it.

With several very beautiful stained glass windows, an impressive staircase and entrance, beautiful intact fireplaces throughout the building and extensive cedar panelling throughout, it is truly a mansion. It provides some insight into how the others might have been able to live in that era. The thought of the cost of upkeep even if the building was as new is enough to give me nightmares. The fact that a succession of owners over the last hundred or so years have allowed it to fall into disrepair perhaps indicates the magnitude of the upkeep expense on such beautiful things.

#### HR HOLDEN SPECIAL SEDAN "Henry"

252,352 HR Holdens were made between April 1966 and January 1968, the base model costing \$2167 with no heater, vinyl floor covering and a 161 cubic inch motor with a three speed 'on-the-tree' manual gearbox.

Our HR is a 'Special' sedan, the middle of the three models, the Premier being the top model. Our



car has the bigger 186 cubic inch motor (a little over 3 litres) with a two speed 'Powerglide' auto transmission. It was originally purchased by Mr George Fyfe of 14 Wales Street, Greenacre NSW, from Suttons Motors at Chullora on 6<sup>th</sup> February 1968, making it one of the last of the model manufactured. Hence the 'HR068' number plates.

The car came complete with the original handbooks and service books. The first service was performed by Suttons Chullora on the 22nd April 1968 at 1042 miles.

It originally had a manual gearbox but sometime during the past 41 years an owner fitted it with the two-speed automatic. It has bench seats, still no heater (soon to be rectified), the original motor



remains, disc brakes on the front (an option in the Special) and it would have originally cost around \$2400.

We bought the car in June this year from a young guy going to university who had appreciation for the car but no idea how to maintain it. He said he

ought it off family friends after the owner, allegedly the original Mr Fyfe – died, leaving four HRs in a shed near Newcastle.

It had oil absolutely everywhere under the bonnet and under the car, no pressure in the tyres and only a slim chance of making the drive from Newcastle to Canberra.

It obviously made the trip and has since had the engine removed and reconditioned by Queanbeyan Engine Service with many new but original-spec parts.

The transmission was checked and is in great condition – Holden imported these from the U.S. where they were used in large V8s so the 186 putting out 94kw was never going to hurt it. Apparently the transmission is so tough it is still used today in drag cars and mountain-climbers. We painted under the bonnet while the motor was out, but the paint unfortunately didn't stick in all places.

The brakes are very good, the diff is untouched and there are only a few spots of rust – I think Holden designed the oil leaks to stop the under-side rusting. The carby has been reconditioned and the engine tuned by Performance Plus in Queanbeyan who have done a great job helping me with the rebuild.

We have put the 1966-68 style white-wall tyres on it as almost identical to the Premier and have a manual-tune AM-only radio being remanufactured in Melbourne. We have been to Cooma and back, to work a few times and to Gundaroo and it drives great.

#### 1950 Chevrolet Club Coupe 437 original actual Miles

This car was purchased new by Mr and Mrs Jessie Trueblood of Modesto in USA. Shortly after purchasing the car, Mr Trueblood took a day off work to go fishing. Whilst waiting for "the big one" to bite, he witnessed a lady fall out of her boat. He jumped in to help, however suffered a fatal heart attack.

Mrs Trueblood returned the car home and parked it in the garage for the next 12 years. The odometer reading at that time (1962) was 413 miles.

Mrs Trueblood lived next door to a car yard owned by William E Wilson who spoke to her frequently and often



told her he would like to buy the car. In 1962, Mrs Trueblood told Mr Wilson that she needed a car for her bookkeeper who didn't really care for the old Chevy and would prefer a Rambler. Mr Wilson immediately bought a car off the local Rambler dealer for \$1,650 (\$100 over cost) and made the swap.

Wilson took it home. The car had 433 original miles and over the next 45 years was occasionally started and moved in and out of his garage and in the 45 years he owned it, only about 5 people had actually been shown the car.

In 2007, Wilson decided to sell the car for US \$60,000 with a buyer quickly arriving to take the car home. 81 year old Mr Wilson



complained about the Capital Gains tax he had to pay and wished he had never sold it.

The car was 100% factory original, even having the original air still in the tyres. The old Chevy now has 437 original miles and is most likely the world's lowest mileage 1950 Chevy
