can change in a moment.



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

1983 DATSUN 200SX

In May of 1983, while looking for a new summer cruiser, I came upon a Datsun 200SX Hatchback on the lot of Westboro Datsun in Ottawa. This car was not my first, second or even third choice. The Honda Prelude had debuted in 1982 and these were still sold before being driven off the trailer. The Salesman for a local Mazda/Mercedes dealership thought that a 27 year old, in jeans (me), didn't have the cash to buy the RX7 in his showroom, and Toyota Celicas were also in short supply. Frankly the big 3 didn't have something I could afford, or want.

This 200SX was a second generation design and was built between 1979 and 1983. Also known in other countries as the S110, Silvia, and Gazelle, and a rally version called the 240RS. The 240RS production ended in 1985.

My 200SX sat alongside another hatchback. The only differences between the 2 hatch backs: one was painted in a two-tone grey, and the other was blue with Air Conditioning. I chose the blue one. The hatch backs looked 'sporty' with the long hood, sloping rear, and raised letter T/A Radials. The 2.2L 4 cylinder fuel-injected engine produced 105HP and stopping was easy on 4 wheel disc brakes. The only downside was the 5 speed standard transmission. Never having driven a car with one, my brother-in-law had to test drive it for me. Undaunted, I bought the car for \$13,500 and risked driving it off the lot. With the first attempt, I nearly took out the dealership's fence. Lesson 1 – Take the transmission out of gear and step on the clutch before turning the key. With the second try I found 1st gear and stalled it. Lesson 2 – Easy on the clutch and give some gas.

This Datsun became my 3 season driver. For the first 10 winters it had a comfortable heated garage, after that it was a cold garage or one of those portable garages. Air Conditioning made driving a pleasure but the ravages of time were taking a toll on the upholstery and paint. Eventually the AC failed, so I drove only one summer without AC. After 20+ years it is still

blowing cold. Except for the AC and a failed Cruise Control solenoid, the only other repairs have been the replacement of 4 batteries, 3 sets of tires, 1 set of brake pads, 2 clutches, and one alternator.

In 2005, I had the windows tinted to slow any more damage to the interior. I also found a source in Oklahoma with some of the original fabrics for the seats and over time accumulated as much as I could find. In 2013, an upholstery shop in Winnipeg replaced the seat covers, head liner, and rear side panels, with what I had found. I found one OEM door panel and I'm still looking for another.

I drove the car on only one long distance road trip; in 1984 I travelled from Ottawa to Saskatoon for my Nephew's birth. On the way back to Ottawa I stopped in Jasper and Calgary. Okay it wasn't a direct route home, but I had a few days to kill. In 1998, I moved to Owen Sound from Ottawa, so for the next 10 years, long drives were limited to the 550km between those 2 cities, on most long weekends.

Now 32 years on the road and only 156,000 km, I can happily say that this little car is still a pleasure to drive.

Back in the early 1980's there was a young neighbourhood kid named Russ, who was about 9 years old, and wanted to get paid to cut my grass for me. All I had at the time was my motorized push mower, and Russ was pretty small and scrawny. Needless to say, he did not get the job, but continued to hang around just to see what "the old guy with the old cars" was doing. Russ had an inquisitive mind and was interested in how mechanical things worked. When he was around 15, he acquired a 1958 Volkswagen Beetle, which he wanted to restore. He lived about a block away from me, and every once in a while he would sneak the VW down the back lane and end up at my place, where we would perform some kind of auto-magic.. I remember doing some bodywork on the bug, and a few other things mechanically.

Russ went to a private school with Rick, another young fellow from the neighbourhood. Russ brought Rick over to see what was going on, and Rick became (and still is) a regular around here. Rick eventually got the grass cutting job, and did that for a few years. My yard is about 1 acre, and at the time I would rather spend my time working on my cars than cutting grass, so Rick made some money. One day an old 1966 Chevy truck drove into my yard, and out of the passenger side pops Rick. The wild-eyed long haired kid driving was Grant. I was really

quite concerned what kind of guys Rick was hanging around with, and asked him about Grant. Well, it turns out that Grant was a terrific guy who loved cars, and went to school with Russ and Rick, so he started hanging around here too. It was always Russ, Rick, and Grant, or some combination of them hanging around and working on stuff. Those guys were like sons to me and I enjoyed their company. They also led me down some good roads where I didn't think I'd ever venture, but they all helped me to find a better path to follow in my life. I thought I was mentoring them, but it turned out to be the other way around.

Well, the years flew by, and it was wonderful watching these young guys grow into fine young men. We all shared automotive adventures, but some of the most memorable were just Grant and myself. Grant was also a good carpenter and assisted me when I was doing some work on my house. He built a wonderful deck for the river side of my house, and it's still standing to this day. He would show up with his latest car project, and sometimes that project would sit in my yard for quite a while as he periodically worked on it. Once again, I thought I was teaching him, but I learned a lot from him. At one time he was getting into Japanese cars and had quite an assortment of them, mostly rust buckets. One day he roared into the yard with a beautiful 1971 Chevy Longhorn pickup truck. It was a camper

special and had a slightly longer box than usual. Those are relatively rare vehicles, and he drove it until it started falling apart.

Time passed, Rick got married, so I saw less of him, as is to be expected. Russ had graduated as a mechanical engineer and moved to Ontario, so Grant was the one I saw the most. One day in 2004, my Nephew in North Carolina told me he wanted to get rid of his 1970 Bronco. Grant heard about it and wanted it. Grant was teaching carpentry at Kildonan East Collegiate at the time, and decided we would drive to North Carolina and get the Bronco during 2004 Spring Break. We ended up using my tired old 1979 Dodge B100 van to haul Kildonan East School's 18 foot car trailer. We had to beef up the van a bit to haul the trailer and then we were on our way. It was an amazing road trip, We got there in about 3 days, the poor old van hauling the heavy trailer through the mountains with hardly a complaint. We spent a few days at my Sister's place in Chapel Hill NC, getting things ready to haul the Bronco home. We had to beef up the van springs a bit more, to compensate for the extra weight of the Bronco. My Nephew sold Grant the Bronco for \$1 US and we were on our way home with it. We left on a Friday morning. Grant wanted to be home before Sunday, so we drove 40 hours straight through, stopping only for gas (lots of it) and food. I'll never forget driving through St Louis at midnight listening to Johnny Cash's last CD. The best road trip ever ! We got back safely, Grant got the Bronco to Kildonan East school, and the body repairs started.

Some time before all this, Grant acquired a 1967 Ford Anglia from his Brother in Law's mother in Ontario. He hauled it home in a large utility trailer (squeezed in tightly) and it sat in my yard for a while. Later in 2004 Grant was deliberately run down in the school parking lot, by a disturbed individual. He was in hospital for a long time and there was some question as to whether he would recover. He was a strong willed guy and was out hobbling around by late summer....just in time to participate in our friend Scott's wedding. Scott was a bit younger than Grant, but by this time he was (and still is) also one of my "kids". Grant was on crutches for the wedding, and in a lot of pain, but managed to drive my 1965 New Yorker as one of the wedding cars.

Grant continued his recuperation, but was off work for a long time. During his down time he assisted me with some renovations in my house, mostly with advice, but some hands on stuff even though he was suffering a lot of pain. Once he was back to school teaching, he and the automotive paint teacher painted the Anglia, and it looked terrific. It was even written up in the Winnipeg Free Press by Larry D'Argis. The car was ready in time for Grant's wedding later in 2005. Of course when he wanted to start the car, it was found to have a dead battery, but that didn't stop Grant. Everyone just pushed the car to start it, several times. Grant and his wife settled into their home, on Heatherdale Road near Lorette, and started their new life together.

On the evening of Feb 28, 2006 Grant phoned me and asked me to go out for a burger with him. I almost said I wasn't up to it, but something told me to say "yes". He picked me up, stopped off at Phil's Auto Parts to pay some money he owed, and we went to Super Boy's on Main Street. We talked about a

lot of things, some of them very deep, and I thought Grant looked very happy and content. It was a wonderful visit. I'm sure glad to have spent that time with him.

The next evening, March 1, 2006, Grant and his wife were driving home around 9 pm in a fairly heavy snow storm on a two lane part of the Perimeter Highway. A fellow in an oncoming truck pulled out to pass, and Grant's car was hit almost head on. Grant must have seen what was going to happen, and at the last moment, turned toward the ditch. Grant's side of the car was hit by the full force of the truck and he died almost instantly. Due to his quick thinking, his wife was only shaken up. After I got the call from Grant's Father the next morning, I was in a state of shock. Thank Heaven for good friends. All my "kids" and their friends came around and we supported each other as only good friends can in times of pain.

The woodworking teachers at Kildonan East built a solid oak casket for Grant. Scott and I picked it up at the school and brought it to our church, where I assisted Grant's Mother and Aunt with installing the lining. There were well over 1000 people at his funeral. I was one of the eight pallbearers, and I chose to ride in the front of the hearse on the way to the cemetery.....our last road trip.

Thanks for indulging me, but I felt that on the 10th anniversary of Grant's death, his story should be told. Some of our MCAAC members knew, or had met Grant over the years, and will remember him fondly. He was an amazing talented man. He packed more living into his 32 years than most people could in 100.

Grant's widow gave Scott the Chevy Longhorn, and the truck has had an outstanding restoration on the body. It's still waiting for a drive train, but that will happen eventually. The Anglia went back to Grant's Brother in Law in Ontario where it's still being cared for. The partially restored Bronco was sold. Shortly after Grant's death, my reliable old '79 Dodge van gave in to terminal rust and mechanical problems. I was thankful that it didn't fail on the road trip.

Some club members wonder why I always encourage them to attend the annual Show and Shine at Kildonan East Collegiate in May. It's all because of Grant and his association with the school. Some of the teachers have become my very good friends over the past few years. Plus, it's a great car show, and it keeps his memory alive for many people. He was a most unforgettable guy and I miss him to this day.

Now you know "the rest of the story". As Grant often used to say, "IT'S ALL GOOD".





**FROM OUR KITCHEN
TO YOURS
FLAPPER PIE**

Ingredients:

- 20 Graham wafers, crushed or 1½ cups crumbs
- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 1/3 cup melted butter
- 1/3 teaspoon cinnamon

Method:

- Mix the above ingredients until crumbly.
- Save ½ cup for topping.
- Press remainder of mixture into a 9-inch pie plate.
- Bake at 350° F for about 10 minutes and cool.

Filling Ingredients:

- 2 cups whole milk
- ½ cup white sugar
- 3 egg yolks, beaten
- 2 tablespoon corn starch
- ½ teaspoon vanilla

Method:

- In saucepan or double boiler combine sugar, cornstarch, milk, salt and egg yolks.
- Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture comes to a boil and starts to thicken.
- Blend in vanilla and a bit of butter if desired.
- When still warm pour into Graham wafer pie shell and top with meringue.

Meringue

- Beat egg whites until soft peaks form.
- Add ¼ cup of sugar gradually and beat until stiff.
- Pile onto warm filling, spreading to edge, covering filling completely.
- Sprinkle remainder of crumb mixture over top and bake at 350° F for 10 minutes or until golden brown.
- Let cool for about 3 hours and serve.






Next meeting is Sunday, March 13th, 2016 at 2:00 p.m.

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
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
