I recommend you do not wait until it's too late, and become a recognised organ donor now and discuss that decision with your family.

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STHARC GENERAL MEETING Queanbeyan Guide Hall 10th July 2025

The meeting commenced at 7.02 pm. The President welcomed members to the meeting and reminded them to place their phones on silent and to sign the attendance book.

Attendance and apologies as per Attendance Book.

Visitors: John Balkos (1971 Honda Z 50; Toyota Town Ace) introduced himself to the meeting, indicating an interest in joining the club, and was welcomed by the President.

New Members: On the Committee's recommendation, members unanimously approved the membership of David Welsh, Eric Darling; Zoe Azzopardi and James Tough.

Minutes of the 12 June 2025 meeting accepted (moved Bruce Legge; seconded Ray Malam).

President's Remarks: The President noted that 2025/26 membership cards were available for collection at the conclusion of the meeting. He noted that the Duty of Care document prepared by Tony Brown had been revised in light of comments from members and was now called "Guidelines for Participation at Club Events and Club Runs". The revised draft had been circulated to Members and the Committee recommended its adoption. Members unanimously endorsed the guidelines which will now be dated 10 July 2025 and posted on the website. The guidelines will be a 'live' document, evolving as required. The President thanked Tony for his excellent work in preparing the document for STHARC. The President also reminded members of the club's Annual General Meeting in August, encouraging all members to consider nominating for a Committee role. In particular, the club will require a new Treasurer this year; this is a critical role, but is not onerous and the new occupant is certain to receive excellent handover support from the current Treasurer

Treasurer's Report: Since last month, income has comprised membership fees and raffle proceeds. Expenditure has comprised printing and postage of *The Wheel*; name badges; payment for apparel; and an \$800 donation for the annual use of the Guide Hall (for which the club has received a letter of thanks from the Guides). As of 10 July, 73 % of members have renewed their membership (indicating that 24 members have yet to renew); owners must be a financial member of a club for their vehicles to be registered. Report accepted (moved Bruce Legge; seconded Darryl Bourke).

Secretary's Report: The club has received hard copies of the Coota Hoota, Bike Torque and Crankhandle. Electronic copies of the Klaxon and Dinkum Oil, as well as information on the Bay to Birdwood Rally and Terribly British Day have been forwarded to members. Report accepted (moved Bruce McCarron; seconded Alan Boyd).

Registrar's Report: The Registrar noted that Services NSW, in collaboration with their Victorian and ACT counterparts, are starting to attend car club events, issuing defect notices where cars are found to be non-compliant.

Editors' Report: On behalf of the Editorial Team, Rhonda Ahearn encouraged members to continue submitting articles to *The Wheel,* including articles on their first car.

Property Officer: Mike Oborn noted that he was currently holding a run out of old stock – details will be included in the next Wheel - and that the new apparel was expected to be available from September.

CACTMC Delegate: Chuck Landwehr noted that next year Wheels will be relocating from the Queanbeyan Showground to Thoroughbred Park as the latter event is substantially cheaper to rent. CACTMC is planning a car show in conjunction with the Hall markets.

CHMC Delegate: Alan Boyd reported that the 2025 CHMC AGM will be held in Cowra on 25 October and that STHARC member, Rod Luke, attended the CHMC Rally in Dubbo in March with his 1982 Daimler.

Christine Hillbrick-Boyd, CHMC Secretary, reminded members that the CHMC publication Dinkum Oil (circulated to members) contained valuable updates on information from Transport NSW. She also noted that police are increasingly checking that cars registered under the Classic Vehicle Scheme are not modified; modified vehicles need to registered under the Historic Vehicle Scheme. Christine noted that, unfortunately, no club had volunteered to host the 2026 CHMC Rally. A CHMC survey about the rally will be forwarded to STHARC members shortly; members are encouraged to complete and return the survey to provide CHMC with guidance on this matter. While it is not viable for STHARC to host a Rally in this region, the club has twice previously hosted the CHMC October meeting and Christine hopes we could do so again in the future.

Guest Speaker:

Rebecca Templeton gave a very interesting presentation to members on organ donation, noting:

There are 18,000 people in Australia currently waiting on an organ donation and transplant numbers have been declining;

In 2024 there were 527 successful donations from 183,000 deaths; Family consent to donation is required even for registered donors and consent rates are higher where the family is already aware of the donor's wish to donate:

Donations save lives; one donor can potentially save up to seven lives;

There is no age limit on donors;

It takes only a few minutes on-line to become a registered organ donor.

The President and club members thanked Rebecca for her interesting and thought provoking presentation.

Love, Loss & Plum Crazy

They say love finds you when you least expect it. For me, it roared in on four wheels, wrapped in gold paint with a seized 426ci Hemi under the hood — a 1970 Dodge Challenger that would become my first true love.

The timing wasn't ideal. My father had just passed away, and I was consumed by grief. In a moment of desperation and retail therapy, I found myself drunk and scrolling eBay while on RAAF training at HMAS Cerberus. One miscalculated bid later, I woke up with a hangover and an email congratulating me — I'd just won the auction.

Panic set in. I was a junior technician, barely keeping a house deposit together, and had just committed to buying a muscle car I'd only ever dreamed about. My plan was simple: meet the seller, offer a polite bottle of wine, and pull out of the purchase with some dignity intact.

But fate had other plans...

At a panel beating shop on the north side of Spencer Street in Melbourne, I met an old Italian man who introduced me to the angel. As soon as I laid eyes on her, disaster struck — I fell in love. The wine was handed over without a word, and I bolted to the nearest bank to withdraw the funds and hire a trailer.

She was far from stock: gold paint, a green interior, carbon fibre front end, line lockers, tubbed rear wheels, and a 426ci Hemi locked solid from years of abuse. But to me, she was perfect — a bruised and battered beauty rescued from the drag strip.

Over the next five years, I began restoring her between a garage and an aircraft hangar at RAAF Base Tindal. I replaced the aftermarket panels with factory sheet metal, sold the old engine for nearly what I paid for the car, and dropped in a 318ci Fireball V8 to bring it back to its original spec. The tubs were brought back to factory width, the interior swapped from green to classic black, and she was repainted in her rightful colour: **Plum Crazy**.

She even made it to my wedding as my chariot — although not without drama. After failing the pits due to a non-compliant exhaust, I discovered a VicRoads loophole that allowed driving under permit, and we made it happen.

These days, the old girl lives a quieter life. She rests in her shed, slowly defrosting between family trips to the servo and back. She's no longer a drag car — she's part of the family.

Her story is simple. Two American owners, then two Aussies. But her soul? That's eternal. She gave me healing when I needed it most, and in return, I gave her a second life.
